## *From Pastor Lem's Desk*

This month I would like to share with you a devotion from Oswald Chambers' "My Utmost for His Highest" here is an adapted version of the devotion titled "The Call of the Natural Life"

2 Corinthians 5:9 (NKJV) — "Therefore we make it our aim, whether present or absent, to be well pleasing to Him."

"We make it our aim..." These words remind us that the Christian life does not drift forward by accident. It requires a deliberate choice and a sustained effort to keep our true goal constantly before us. We must hold ourselves to this highest priority—not just in moments of inspiration, but year after year. Our first ambition is not to win souls, establish churches, or lead revivals, as important as those things may be. Our primary pursuit is singular: to be well pleasing to Him.

Failure in the Christian life is rarely due to a lack of spiritual experience. More often, it comes from neglecting to keep our eyes fixed on the right goal. For this reason, we should regularly examine ourselves before God—at least weekly—asking whether our lives measure up to His standard.

The Apostle Paul models this kind of focus. Paul likens this focus to a musician who plays not for the applause of the audience, but for the approving glance of the Conductor. He lives for one approval alone. As he exhorts Timothy:

2 Timothy 2:15 (NKJV) — "Be diligent to present yourself approved to God, a worker who does not need to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

Any goal—even a noble one—that diverts us, however slightly, from this central aim of being approved by God can weaken our usefulness in His service. When we clearly see where this goal leads, we begin to understand why Scripture urges us to keep our focus fixed in the right place:

Hebrews 12:2 (NKJV) — "Looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God."

# *Article review and Christians at Play*

In a recent article in the January/February issue of Christian Today by David Zahl entitled “Blessed are the Pickleball Players,” the author shares his belief that having fun might be the greatest testament to the gospel of God’s grace. He cites the freedom of the spirit we have as Christians and how play can be an expression of that freedom. It is also a manifestation of our individual God-given gifts. Mathew 18:2-3 is cited, “Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.” The author asks us to look beyond the seemingly trivial nature of play and embrace the joy, wonder, and gifts of play.

In his book “The Four Loves,” C. S. Lewis says friendship is the least natural of loves, as it isn’t necessarily in terms of biology, and he was afraid it was becoming a lost art in the modern world. He wrote that in 1960, and I fear he would be even more worried about the fate of friendship in 2026. Lewis points to Biblical friendships, like that of David and Jonathan, as true friendships. The ancients seemed to value friendship as the happiest and most fully human of all loves. This is another reason we should look upon play as a spiritually important part of our lives.

If you look at the back of this and any edition of this newsletter, you will find a calendar with all of the planned activities for the month. You can find many different activities throughout the month and year. We have recently been hosting more get-togethers around holidays as a way to celebrate with our church family and “play,” if you will. In Zechariah 8:5, the New Jerusalem is said to be filled with “boys and girls playing. As adults, it is an ever increasingly serious world; we sometimes need to remember that God has promised us a season for everything, and sometimes it is the season for joy, friendship, and play. What better sound can our Father hear than laughter and companionship within His house?

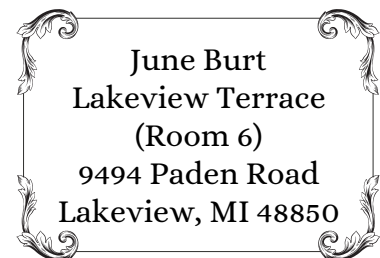
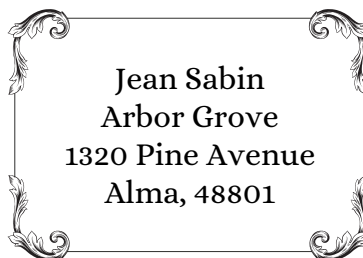
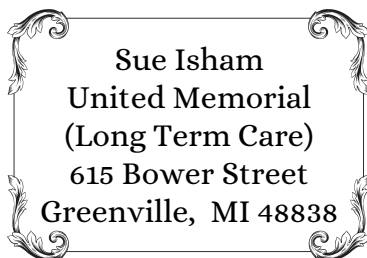

## Our Daily Bread Ministries®

When explaining how valuable he found time with an older advisor who regularly listened to his concerns, Tomáš said, “He is my hollow willow.” When I looked at him blankly, Tomáš explained that the phrase is a Slovak expression signifying someone who keeps your secrets. In essence, the person is like a willow tree holding confidential information safely within its trunk.

It’s a treasure to have someone to whom we can confide our deepest fears and longings. Perhaps speaking from his own

experience, in a section of Proverbs highlighting the power of our words, King Solomon commended the individual who displays discretion or can “[hold] their tongue” (Proverbs 11:12). He also contrasted two people: “A gossip betrays a confidence, but a trustworthy person keeps a secret” (v. 13). The comparison is a helpful reminder to carefully steward private conversations, though we shouldn’t remain silent if we’re genuinely concerned for someone’s safety.

In our digital world, where we can quickly spread information, it can be tempting (and easy) to share juicy details that might generate reactions. But gossip not only hurts the individual who trusted you enough to share, it also causes significant damage to relationships when confidences are broken. We can all aspire to be “hollow willows,” people of integrity who can be trusted to keep a confidence.

1 Corinthians 9:27 (NKJV) — "But I discipline my body and bring it into subjection, lest, when I have preached to others, I myself should become disqualified."

Everything in life must be brought into alignment with this one central aim. We must learn to relate every decision, every ambition, and every action to the goal of pleasing Christ, maintaining it without interruption.

# CHURCH COUNCIL

MARCH 17, 2026

Present: Pastor Lem Granada, Becky West, Jane Beach, Georgia Bohn, Janella Hicks

Pastor Lem started the meeting at 11:00 with prayer.

The minutes were reviewed. Jane made a motion, and Janella seconded to approve the minutes and place them on file. The motion carried.

**Becky:** Becky let the Council know that she and Janella would like to attend a class, “The Spirit and Art of Conflict Transformation.” It will be held at the Alma Methodist Church on April 18 and 25, 2026. We need the Council's approval and the Pastor's signature on the application. Becky walked through the kitchen with a Public Health Inspector. Three sinks were recommended, as well as a change to the kitchen drain. Kitchen countertop options were discussed/ wood vs. impervious product. Wood needs constant maintenance and treatment to keep it sanitary. Pastor Lem made a motion to approve the three sinks, the drain revamp, and impervious perimeter countertop instead of butcher block. Georgia seconded, discussion held; vote taken, motion carried. Georgia will talk to Matt Jordon about the decisions. Becky discussed the personal kitchen certification. Becky and Kathy Bongard are certified for the kitchen. This means one of them has to be there when the kitchen is in use. Pastor Lem suggested Brandon Moore as another option since he has a commercial certification through his business.

**Women in Faith:** We are getting ready for the yard sale. Calley had printed flyers to be taken to local businesses. Sara said she would contact the Curtis Center about having it on their digital display. Calley will put the dates and info in the Lakeview paper, FB, and the Senior paper. Jean has volunteers for food and to help with the Easter breakfast.

**Trustees:** Patching the south drive will have to wait until the frost leaves the ground. The holes will be coned off for the food truck this Thursday. There is a gutter and a downspout in the front that came down during the high wind and needs to be repaired. Jane commented that we need to get some mowing bids in soon.

**SPRC:** Kathy Helms attended two long online safe gathering classes. This will be greatly appreciated by the church members who use the Sunday School

**Memorial:** Cathy and Leann have already removed the kitchen wallpaper border and painted it.

**Worship:** There will be a Good Friday service. Maybe that could be put on the digital sign at the Curtis Center.

**Pastor Lem** brought up concerns about understanding the current bible studies. It was suggested that maybe an outline or summary of the previous week's study might help. This is a difficult study. Further discussion was held. Pastor will be at the conference last weekend in May. Brandon will speak for him that Sunday. We will need CPR classes and at some point, a new defibrillator.

1. The Finance Committee Meeting was called to order on April 14th, 2026, at 11 AM.

- Becky West opened the meeting in prayer.
- Georgia Bohne shared a devotion on ease/personal peace/finding our inner divine guidance.
- Jane Beach will do devotions for the May meeting.

2. Review of previous minutes:

- March minutes reviewed and accepted as printed.

3. Treasurer's Report

- Leann provided copies of the church's financial reports.
  - March 2026: Income: \$9,274.51 Expenses: \$10,999.68
  - All bills and ministry shares are current.
  - Net: **-\$1,725.17**
  - YTD: Income: **-\$7,337.94**. The negative year-to-date balance is a significant concern.
  - Currently, about half of the flood repairs have been donated—approximately \$1,500 out of \$3,000+.
  - There will be two larger expenses coming up soon—the south church driveway entrance will require repair, and the parsonage drain line.
  - Jane Beach will prepare a Congregational Update for Becky to share on April 19th.
  - Reminders about the financial concern will be shared every two weeks for two months as well.
  - Jane suggested that some type of visual aid—a thermometer for funds needed might be helpful as well.
  - Jane Beach mentioned that the Sunday School Salary fits within the guidelines of the John Anderson #1 fund. After discussion, Jane made a motion to pay the Sunday School Salary retroactive to January 1, 2026, out of John Anderson #1. Pastor Lem seconded the motion. Motion passed by group vote.
  - Discussion occurred about the possibility of using all the Rummage Sale proceeds for the general fund. Often, money is set aside for missions, but that may be adjusted as needed. This will be explored further, and a recommendation will be sent to the Church Council as necessary.
  - Jane moved to accept the Treasurer's Report. Georgia seconded. Motion passed by group vote.

4. Old Business

- Amy Anderson will do our audit. This initial audit will cover a two-year period. After this, a decision will be made regarding annual audits versus audits every 2 years. Leann and Amy have begun the audit process.
- Mowing costs are not yet available. —Georgia will reach out to Ted from Trustees to see where they are with mowing, as mowing season will be early this year. o Trustees will get bids. o Once a bid is chosen, we will draft a letter to the congregation explaining mowing costs and asking for contributions as we did last year. Last year, mowing donations paid for lawn care entirely.

5. New Business

6. Around The Table

- Georgia-Janowicz Funeral Home sent a check to the church for funeral expenses for the recent funeral. Our Funeral Policy will be reviewed during the Church Council meeting to make sure the figures are accurate. Updated policy will be shared with Janowicz.
- Jane mentioned that the website and Facebook page should be reviewed and updated. Some information still needs updating, and both should be reviewed to be more user-friendly. Will be discussed further at Church Council.

# FINANCIAL UPDATE

APRIL 2026

Dear Church Family and Friends,

We last gave a Financial Update near the end of 2025. We are presenting this update to share ongoing financial concerns with you.

A reminder of our many blessings! We continue to be tremendously blessed by Pastor Lem and Colleen. We tremendously benefit from their ministry and their involvement in numerous church activities. In addition to their ministry, Pastor Lem uses his retirement health insurance, which means Edmore Faith saves over \$20,000 annually by not having to provide health insurance. Wow! Pastor Lem is also listed as a half-time pastor, but we all know we see him far more than that. This is an additional significant financial blessing. Thank you, Pastor Lem and Colleen!

We have a wonderful church family who care deeply about each other, about our surrounding communities, and about those farther away whom we help through our mission work. Our church is full of joy—coffee hour finds folks chatting and laughing. We have willing workers keeping our church and parsonage in the best shape possible. Sunday worship is enjoyed by all. We see a few new faces joining us for worship. We are happy to share our wonderful church home with groups needing a spot: AA and Euchre groups meet regularly, as well as our monthly Friends and Fellowship. The Men's bi-monthly Bible Study and monthly Grief Group (including non-church family members) are great additions to church life and to what our church can offer to others!

The Finance Committee continues to monitor finances and suggest adjustments if/when needed to be the best stewards of our funds. It was hoped that 2026 would have a positive impact on our financial situation, but that has not been the case. As of April 14th, we are down approximately \$7,337.94. This is obviously an area of significant concern that needs to be shared with you. **If this were our household budget, our income would not cover our expenses.**

In addition to the above deficit, Edmore Faith is still paying for the flood expenses. We also have two significant repairs in the near future—the driveway entrance and parsonage drain line.

Please keep our church in your prayers always, but **especially at this time**. Please do continue your faithful giving. As we move forward from this stressful financial situation, steady, regular giving remains so important. Edmore Faith is blessed by so many giving at the maximum for their life situation, so thank you! Your giving allows our church to continue to be the beacon of hope and help for the community for which it is so well known.

If possible, please consider additional giving to offset our deficit, especially to help with the unexpected flood expenses, the driveway, and the parsonage drain.

Please prayerfully consider ideas for enhancing the overall financial health of Edmore Faith.

The 10% increase in giving chart is still available in the Welcome Center.

Brainstorm fundraising and cost-cutting ideas and bring those ideas to Church Council—a fresh perspective on a challenge can often be just what is needed.

Pray, Pray Pray with FAITH---God has great answers to this concern!

The Finance Committee will continue to closely monitor the financial situation to determine if further action is needed. Thank you for being such an important part of this church family.
